In 2016, he joined Edebé Express as an ELT Consultant and dedicates his time advising, coaching and providing training solutions to schools and teachers in Southern Spain.

Angel Anderson has been teaching for well over 30 years, mainly in Spain and mainly preparing teenagers for the Cambridge upper suite exams. He has also been involved in management, course development and teacher training, but is happiest in a classroom surrounded by kids. When not teaching or leading the Cultural English Centre's Friday writing workshops, he can be found co-running TCEC-TC, the centre's teen theatre club.

Boelo van der Pool is not a language teacher. Nevertheless, he's been involved in language learning since 1994 and has been running his own school (together with his wife, Angie) since 1999. He holds a Master Degree in Coaching and Emotional Intelligence and specializes in Language Coaching. He has been coaching language students since 2017 which has granted Babel Idiomas a national FECEI award for innovation. Being a teacher trainer, he is also leading partner in an Erasmus + project on Language Coaching.

Chris Johnson has been in TEFL for over 10 years. During this time he has completed his DELTA and a Masters in EMT (Educational Management in TESOL). He has also been a DOS and a Cambridge speaking examiner for B1, B2 & C1. Active within our profession, he enjoys speaking regularly at the ACEIA, TESOL and FECEI conferences.

Chris Roland is an 'ideas man' based at ELI in Seville. He teachers regular weekly classes with YL's, teens and adults while being very active on the international conference circuit. His methodology book Understanding Teenagers in the ELT Classroom is available from Pavilion Publishing & Media.

Claire Potter has worked in Spain since 1994 and is head of Teacher Training at at CLIC IH Sevilla and Malaga. She is a tutor on CELTA, DELTA and IHCYLT courses and is a CELTA and DELTA assessor. Her interests include promoting real communication in the classroom and developing learners' language skills.

Hannah Beardsworth is a teacher and teacher trainer based at clic ih seville. She has been working in state and private schools for the last 19 years and specialises in working with young learners.
